# Leadership Reflections



It has been my honor stepping into this role in 2025 serving as new UICSL Executive Director. Being able to give back so much to Utah's American Indian/Alaska Native community is truly humbling and a daily reward.

While our team faced many challenges this year including organizational restructuring, I am so proud of the staff's perseverance and the trajectory of our future, growth, and impact during our organization's 51<sup>st</sup> year.

We were able to further expand our clinic by increasing service lines and providers, such as pediatrics and women's health, with more slated for 2026. To complement clinical care, UICSL expanded our Diabetes program into a comprehensive Public Health department with a focus on meeting people where they are in the community. As part of this expansion, we also developed our patient transportation after feedback for our members that transportation can often be a barrier. Our trauma-informed behavioral health staff grew by 300% in only months, enabling us to provide group therapy along with traditional sweats and healing.

UICSL will continue to *Serve The People* by hiring more Native staff and providers for our expanding services in radiology, pharmacy, psychiatry, women's health, prevention, case management, and family & community.



With our foundation strong and staff now set, we will continue our path to keep this momentum. Salt Lake's downtown area is ready to rebuild and so are we as UICSL is prepared for another 50 years Serving The People.

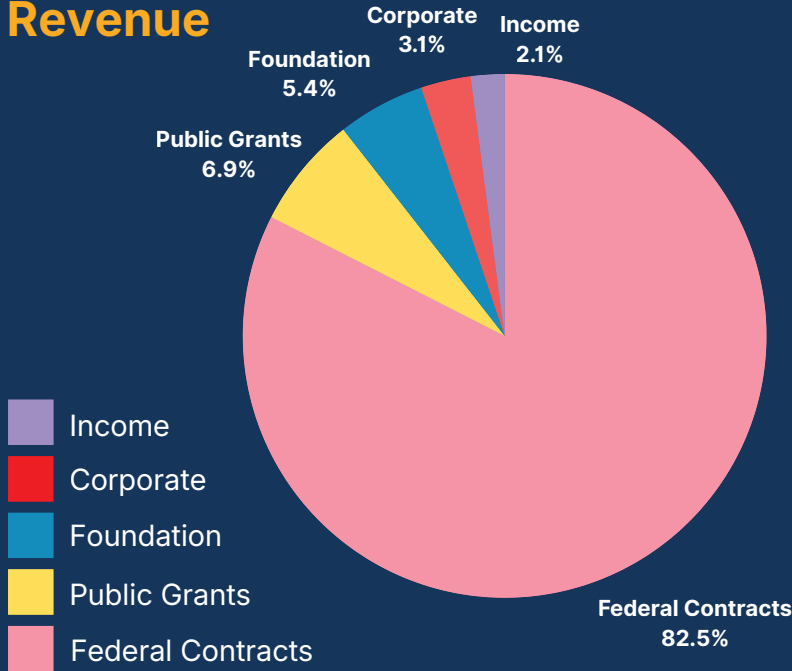

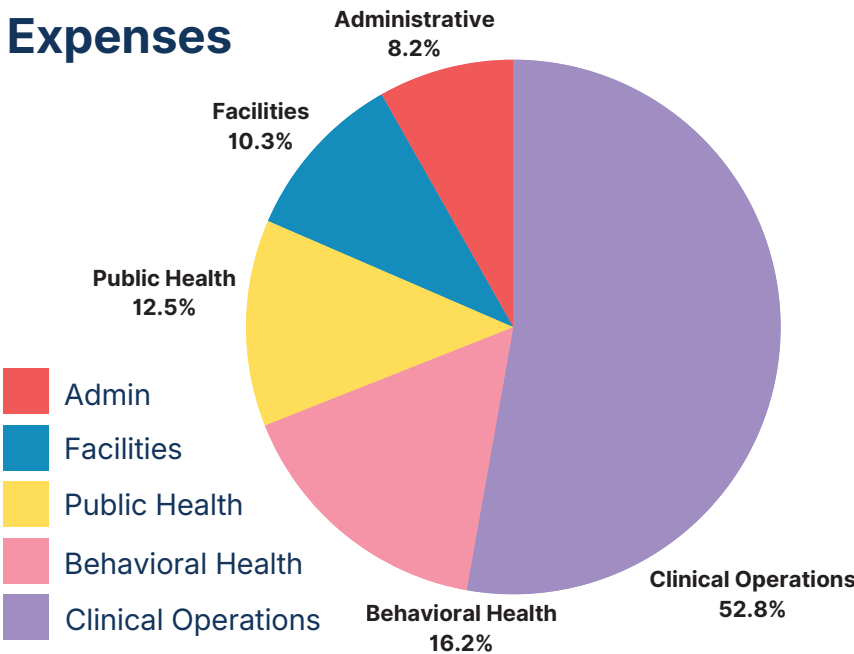

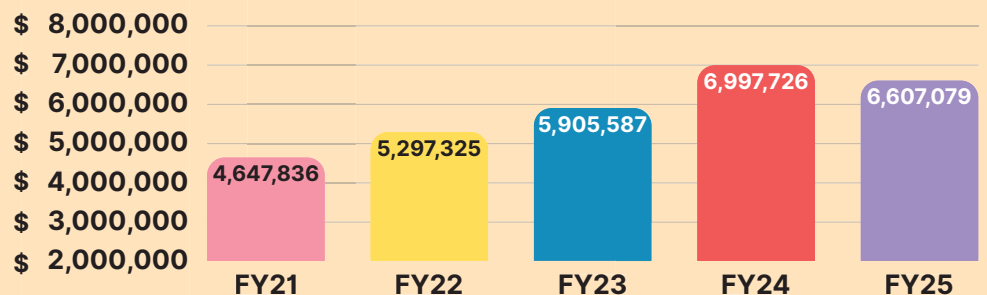

The year began strong with the hiring of our new Medical Director, Dr. Tim Duerler, who joins UICSL as a board-certified family medicine physician. Under his leadership, Dr. Duerler has been responsible for clinical growth of our primary care, pediatrics, women's health, radiology, mammography, and integrated healing.

UICSL continued clinical expansion with the hiring of Dr. Sharon Austin to head our new Public Health team, a fast-growing department designed to complement our diabetes prevention and wellness via year-round activities and classes. Dr. Austin has helped to develop our growing women's, maternal, and aging programs. Diabetes prevention and fitness has grown in support this past year to feature more youth and adult fitness groups, lacrosse, basketball, cooking, gardening, hiking, boxing, yoga, mentorship, and more.

The UICSL transportation program grew its fleet to four vehicles this year, providing Native Elders and families free, reliable access to care. Lack of transportation is one of three barriers to medical care which our team seeks to mitigate. As we expand into rural programming, UICSL will continue to strengthen our transportation program to include services other than clinical care.

This year sadly marked the first full year without the Salt Lake Bees and their fun, excitement, and vibrance to the Ballpark Neighborhood. As the neighborhood is being reimaged, UICSL has committed to be a downtown partner during this transition as we look forward to another 50 years.

## Greatest Developments of FY25



### Team Members

2025 marked the most employees and providers UICSL has ever had at 50. As Salt Lake continues to grow, so do we!



### Clinical Expansion

UICSL clinic grew its primary care, labs, pediatrics, women's health, radiology, pharmacy, and insurance services.



### Transportation

New transportation service for patients and Elders without means to arrive to appointments or pharmacy visits.



### Native Garden

Funded by several partners, the on-site garden has more than quadrupled in size, crops, output, and community impact.

# The People



Our three locations in Salt Lake, Murray, and West Valley provide primary care, community health services, counseling, administrative support, and culturally grounded events, classes, and activities.

Designated by the federal Indian Health Service, our service area includes the five counties of Salt Lake, Tooele, Utah, Davis, and Weber with rural outreach and accessibility to the surrounding counties.

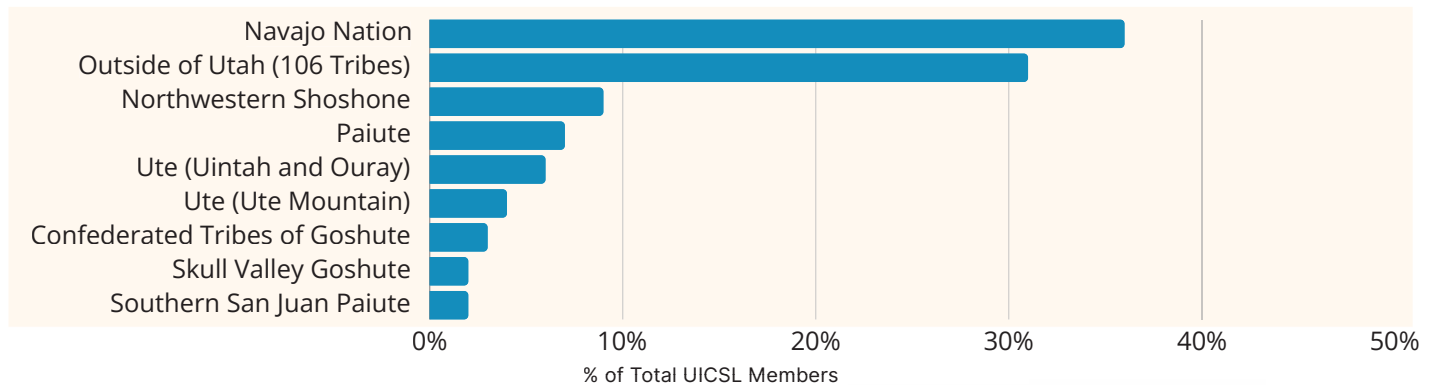
UICSL collaborates with the eight tribal nations of Utah: Northwestern Band of Shoshone Nation, Confederated Tribes of Goshute, Skull Valley Band of Goshute, Paiute Indian Tribe of Utah, San Juan Southern Paiute Tribe, Ute Indian Tribe of the Uintah and Ouray Reservation, Ute Mountain Ute Tribe, and Navajo Nation.

In 2025, UICSL served 114 tribes from across the country here at our downtown Salt Lake location.

Utah's Native American population rose 27% from the 2010 census (32,927) to the 2020 census (41,644), then another 35% in 2025 (56,622) as members from various tribes are choosing Utah as their home. The 2025 Healthy Salt Lake demographics find that 13,951 Salt Lake County residents are American Indian/Alaska Native (1.6% of population).

## Love Your Block Mural Painting

In partnership with Salt Lake City Arts Council and its *Love Your Block* initiative, UICSL participated in the artistic revitalization of our Ballpark neighborhood by collaborating with local artists to install a mural visible along 1300 South. Collaboration included repainting building exteriors, repairing sidewalks and accessibility markings, flower bed restoration, and community pride.



## Boo To The Flu

Held every Halloween season, our Boo To The Flu immunization event helps families stay healthy and prepared during flu season while having a little Halloween fun. UICSL employees, providers, board members, and volunteers decorate their cars for the on-site Trunk-or-Treat event, providing games, prizes, treats, and frights to all participants and their families.

## Annual Harvest Arts Market

The UICSL Harvest Arts Market is an annual gathering where local Native artists and vendors are able to share their work and stories, create space for connection, and cultural exchange. In 2025, the Arts Market had grown so much in popularity that UICSL now hosts multiple per year in the Fall, Winter, and Spring, including separate days for Youth and Elder vendors.

## Indigenous Peoples' Day 5K (October 11)

The 4th Annual *In the Steps of Our Ancestors* Indigenous Peoples' Day 5K brings the community together in recognition of Indigenous Peoples' Day and their strength, diversity, and resilience. Held along the Jordan River within a 252 acre preserve protecting ancient tribal territories, the space connects participants to land, history, and visibility for Native communities.

**2025 Impact: 88 registered community members**



## Girls On The Run

Each year, UICSL's Family & Community Services partners with the local nonprofit *Girls On The Run* to help provide our 3<sup>rd</sup> - 8<sup>th</sup> grade girls a space to learn the joy of running within a fun, supportive environment. Each program hosts an 8-week event to help participants prepare for a community 5K event, designed to inspire girls of all abilities to recognize and embrace their inner strength and make meaningful connections with others.

Ever since expanding clinical operations out to Murray in 2024, UICSL has experienced some of the most remarkable changes across the entire organization. The clinic has quickly become our flagship program, as it has expanded to provide Utah's growing Native American population with services comparable to their tribal reservations.

One of the most impactful additions of 2025 was the hiring of our current Medical Director, Dr. Timothy Duerler, who comes to UICSL as a board-certified family medicine physician with a background in culturally attuned care models.

Under Dr. Duerler's leadership, the UICSL clinic has further developed its primary care services to include pediatrics, women's health, radiology, gerontology, mammography partnerships, and increased integrated healing. In partnership with the University of Utah's College of Pharmacy, the clinic will cut the ribbon on our pharmacy to be located on-site at our Murray clinic in 2026.

## Maternity & Infant Care

Hiring our new UICSL pediatrician was one of the biggest efforts made to help bridge the gap in services among AI/AN mothers in Utah. Prior to our new pediatric services, UICSL could only provide referrals for infant and maternity care.

Dr. Maggie Bale joins UICSL from the University of Utah with a background in public health and service. Having worked at Children's Primary Hospital, Dr. Bale has many years' experience in comprehensive well-child visits, immunizations, developmental care, and family medicine.

UICSL also entered into a collaboration with the National Council of Urban Indian Health (NCUIH) new Maternal Mortality Review Committee to help expand education, resources, and national collaboration as we further expand services.

## Mammogram Bus

In partnership with Huntsman Cancer Institute and University of Utah Health, UICSL is now able to provide regular on-site mammography screenings to our patients via the Huntsman Mobile Mammogram bus. With low-cost and no-cost vouchers available, mobile screening options help supplement our growing radiology program as we are finalizing our own in-house equipment and provider for 2026.



## Pharmacy Expansion

Planned to open in spring of 2026, the UICSL pharmacy expansion will provide patients the convenience of having their provider and pharmacist in the same location. In addition to providing comprehensive pharmacy services and education, we will provide home visitations, prescription delivery, and client transportation.

Partnered with University of Utah Associate Professor of Pharmacotherapy, Joey Mattingly, who provided UICSL Administration guidance to help design, stock, and launch the new on-site pharmacy. Patients will receive education on prescriptions, counseling, and cost effective drugs from the 340B Drug Pricing Program.

The Mental Health component of the Medicine Wheel is provided by our 6-person Behavioral Health team, each specializing in different fields of social work to provide clients comprehensive clinical therapy and recovery.

Our Native-led Behavioral Health team provides a healthy space for AI/AN clients to navigate their mental health, as many issues can be deeply rooted in cultural trauma and mistrust.

In the years since COVID, we've learned that there is a demand for mental health services in all communities. UICSL continues to meet that need by further developing our team in hopes of bringing stability, support, and reconnection to Utah's Native Americans.



In 2025, Behavioral Health grew to a 6-person team featuring (1) LCSW program manager, (2) CSW therapists, (2) Substance Use Disorder counselors, and (1) Case Manager.

## **Substance Use Disorder Counseling**

Our quickly growing SUD counseling program provides patients Intensive Outpatient care, structured treatment and education in areas of early recovery, relapse prevention, life skills, group therapy and culturally relevant means of rehabilitation. In addition to clinical support, SUD patients are encouraged to participate in such community activities as our on-site sweat lodge, fitness groups, traditional foods, garden club, and cultural classes. Counselors invite patients to explore the spiritual dimensions of recovery in hopes of filling the gap by replacing addiction with community, heritage, and spirit.

## **Case Management**

Case management has been a vital addition to the Behavioral Health team, as it enables us to provide even more dynamic services to some of the most underserved individuals from our AI/AN community.

In 2025, case management experienced a sharp increase of requests for basic needs, housing vouchers, and job assistance as it seems to be a reflection of a broader issue. Unable to ignore the need in our downtown community, UICSL has begun to expand local partnerships to help develop LMI/FPL supportive housing units for qualifying Utah Native American families.

## **Sweat Lodge**

Built in 2016, the UICSL Sweat Lodge provides Behavioral Health patients with a supplemental approach to care, as it is only 1 of 2 traditional Sweat Lodges in Utah outside of the tribal reservations. 2025 was the busiest year for the Sweat Lodge since COVID, prompting UICSL to seek funding for redevelopment. We contract with local Native experts with the experience in leading men, women, and coed sweats.

UICSL Public Health began in 2025 with the hiring of Dr. Sharon Austin to develop family-based initiatives for Native Utah households. Dr. Austin has since partnered UICSL with several national collaboratives dedicated to furthering our impact in prevention and maternal health.

UICSL Public Health began in 2025 to supplement our federal National Diabetes Prevention program, helping to establish more partnerships, activities, engagement, and ultimately impact across Salt Lake. Our National Diabetes Prevention program has been offered for 8 years now in which UICSL provides coaching, peer support, and results tracking 2-3 times per year. UICSL Public Health is a partnering agency for the Special Diabetes Program for Indians (SDPI) as we target diseases that disproportionately affect Native Americans.

About 74% of all clients at UICSL who receive care have a BMI greater than 30; not just overweight but obese. Lifestyle factors are one of the most direct causes of obesity, and our Public Health team maintains a year-round calendar of activities to help provide our clients with community, family, and healthy accountability.



## UICSL Garden

Funded by the American Heart Association and supported by other local collaborators, our newly expanded on-site garden has quadrupled in size, output, varieties, and community impact. The UICSL garden supplements Public Health by producing healthy dietary options for our clients while also providing a space for community, education, and outdoors. In addition to health and prevention, the garden is intended to help foster community as we invite members of all ages and experience levels to share exchanges in intergenerational experiences. Native crops you can expect to find in the UICSL garden include sweetgrass, sage, Hopi corn, squash, sunflower, and heirloom tomato cultivars.

## Youth & Adult Fitness

To supplement the physical component of Public Health, our group and community fitness has grown this past 2025 to offer year-round sports, hobbies, and activities for all ages and interests including weekly fitness classes, boxing, yoga, basketball, lacrosse, elderly fitness programs, group hiking, powwow dance, and a weekly running group at the Utah Olympic Oval taught by Native instructors. Diabetes patients with an A1c > 9% are given priority in fitness classes as we seek to help them make a lifestyle change.

## Lacrosse & Basketball Camps

UICSL continued to develop youth athletics programs this year by teaming with several local partners to offer summer camps, skills clinics, and financial compensation for participation fees. Lacrosse and basketball are two sports held in high regard in the Native community, which we would like to preserve for our youth members. Each sport promotes teamwork, leadership, integrity, and cooperation—essential values deeply embedded in Native culture.

Family & Community Services is the backbone of UICSL as many of the events, activities, and classes are how the community recognizes us. It is the heart, spirit, and foundation of our mission. Some cultural and family resources have been hosted at our downtown center for most of our 50 years, such as our culture classes, arts, and prevention. UICSL partners with the Utah State School Board and several districts each year to spread awareness across Utah schools.

## Youth & Family Services

In collaboration with *Title VI American Indian Education* program, UICSL serves the Salt Lake City School District by providing prevention and community programs for AI/AN students. Family & Community Services has been a long-time partner with youth and adult prevention programs Tobacco Prevention and Control Community Partner (Utah DHHS) and Alcohol Substance Abuse Program (IHS), which directly fund most of our K-12 community events.

Providing students healthy habits, lifestyles options, and role models is essential for early prevention. Organizations such as *Girls On The Run Utah* provide our 3<sup>rd</sup> - 8<sup>th</sup> grade girls each year an opportunity to develop healthy habits in a positive team environment. Students also participate in our Public Health's basketball and lacrosse clinics and weekly practice circles.

## Elders Services

UICSL Elders Services recognizes and honors those who came before and helped to build us over the years, as some of our original public supporters still attend regularly. While UICSL elders have always been the foundation of our work, it was during COVID closures that we understood the need for elder-based activities and programming to help them stay connected during social isolation.

Family & Community Services serves 60-70 Native American elders monthly, participating in a number of activities hosted on-site or on a field trip in the community. UICSL just renewed its partnership with the George S. and Dolores Doré Eccles Theater, in which they provide our Elders complimentary tickets for various acts, shows, and Broadway performances.

## Back-To-School

Each year, UICSL provides school supplies, backpacks, and haircuts to about 300 Native American students in preparation for the new school year. Families are invited to eat, play games, tour the garden, have fun all before the summer comes to a close. Organizations such as *University of Utah Center for Native Excellence* provide food, drinks, and fun while educating our 9<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> grade students about the benefits and support they will receive if interested in enrolling in college.

Each year, the UICSL Harvest Arts Market brings together more than a thousand holiday shoppers with local Native American vendors and artists. The event has grown in popularity, vendors, and shoppers each year as locals prefer to support a community-based, Native market.



## **Ryedale Largo & Navajo Youth Dancers**

Attendance: 76

For almost twenty years, Ryedale Largo has brought more than choreography to the stage. Each performance by the Navajo and Mescalero Dance Group shares family history, cultural stories, healing traditions, and a duty to keep Indigenous heritage alive for youth.



## **Diné Bizaad (24-week program)**

Attendance: 125

Over the 24-week program, participants attend community-based activities to learning Diné Bizaad (Navajo) language; incorporating it in everyday activities like chores, cooking, counting money, and community. UICSL is a proud home to several fluent Navajo-speaking employees and members.



## **Sweetgrass Workshop**

Attendance: 32

Our Sweetgrass Workshop brings together a blend of UICSL members, employees, and non-registered community members to experience the benefits of sweetgrass. The evening includes a light workout, sweetgrass sampling, stretching and binding, education, and recipes.
